Dear valued parents, carers and members of the community,

Recently, the school performance tables were published for the results of the class of 2024. I am delighted to report that, once again, Testbourne is the top performing secular school in the Basingstoke and Deane and Andover areas. These performance tables also show that we are not just about academic outcomes. The proportion of children who attended Testbourne and are now in education, employment or training is much higher than that of the overall national and Hampshire figures. This is because we pride ourselves on helping children to become independent, resilient and well-prepared for their future.

This term is the time in which we celebrate exam achievements with the individual children who made them happen, presenting GCSE certificates to our Year 11 cohort from last year. Staff enjoyed chatting to students and their parents and having a bite to eat. We look forward to hearing more about how life at college and beyond goes for our alumni and send our congratulations to the year group once again.

This has been a very busy, action-packed autumn term. We had our open evening and open mornings early in the term and I am pleased to report that we are oversubscribed once more with just under 300 applications for next year's intake. As always, we will strive to take as many of our first-choice applicants as possible by admitting students over our usual admission number. We want to help families avoid the worry and stress caused by not getting their first-choice school.

There has been plenty to note this term, with some outstanding events, trips and visits alongside our usual day-to-day activities. I will let you read about those in the rest of the *Tribune*. A particular highlight, however, was our inaugural fireworks display at the end of October. We sold over 1200 tickets, enjoyed a first-rate professional display, ate lovely food and raised money for the school. We aim to make this an annual event and hope you can help us grow it and make it the destination of choice for fireworks in the local area.

I also had a wonderful time visiting the Christmas Fair with Hernando and one of my three children. It was lovely to talk to families, prospective parents, staff and members of the community, and of course Hernando got most of the attention! It was a lovely event, in which each of our seven Year 7 tutor groups had a fundraising stall alongside our PTFA and members of the community. Our thanks go to all who supported the event and to local businesses that provide matched funding to make this a significant fundraising event for the school as well as a lovely day for the community.

### **GCSE Exams Results 2024**

#### Congratulations to the class of 2024!

The class of 2024 achieved some superb GCSE and Level 2 Vocational Award results. This resulted in a Progress 8 score of +0.09 (December 2024), which is higher than the Progress 8 scores achieved by all other non-religious secondary schools in Basingstoke & Deane and in Andover.

We are proud of the achievements of the class of 2024 and commend these students on their efforts during the time they spent with us. More than three quarters of students achieved a 'standard' pass of



Grade 4 and above in both English and Maths, with over half achieving a 'strong' pass in both. 15% of students achieved the top grades of 9-7 in both English and Maths. More than 80% of students achieved a 'standard' pass or better in two Sciences; two thirds of students studying separate Biology, Chemistry and Physics GCSEs achieved a Grade 7 or above. Many option subjects, including Computer Science, Dance, Design & Technology, Drama, Geography and Music are celebrating pass rates of above 75% with their students in 2024.

Across all subjects, one in seven students achieved at least one of the top Grade 9s (or equivalent) in their GCSEs and vocational awards, whilst 188 Grade 8s or 9s were awarded to students across all subjects. Of these top grades, over half were in English, Maths or Science subjects. In addition to this, our SEND students made above-average progress, thanks to the dedication and support from our teachers and Support Hub colleagues.



### **Open Evening 2024**

Our annual Open Evening, held in September, is a very busy event every year. Hundreds of parents and students come to see the fantastic offer here at Testbourne Community School. We were delighted earlier this term to host another busy and successful evening, with more than 300 visitors who came to see the departments. The Year 11 Prefect team, Year 10 helpers, and some Year 9 Transition Prefects were kept very busy showing parents and students around the site.



Some highlights of the evening included:

- In the Science Department, visitors were able to watch a live dissection, use microscopes to investigate cells, conduct flame tests, test acids and alkalis, have a go at making a chromatography flower and build electrical circuits.
- In the Art Department students were able to create Aztec pendants, which many enjoyed wearing and showing off as they toured around the site.
- PE was popular with an activity carousel in the Theatre Hall due to the wet weather. Lots of students showed off their great physical skills and staff were able to showcase the huge range of extracurricular activities and sport we offer, as well as talk about our excellent results in GCSE PE.
- In English there were various challenges: apostrophes, homophones, match the quote to the play, taste description and Elizabethan English. This gave adults an intellectual workout as well as stretching the students' knowledge too.
- The Art, DT and Music rooms were very busy with students finding out about specialist subjects at Testbourne, alongside Dance, Health and Social Care, Engineering and Computer Science.

At the end of the evening Mr Beck gave a talk in the Sports Hall for more than 200 families, and we were delighted so many people could join us for the event. Thank you to the huge number of staff and students who worked so hard to show off our wonderful school – we really appreciate everything you do.



## **Open Morning 2024**

In the first week of October we held our very popular Open Mornings, which provide a chance for prospective parents and students to visit the school and see lessons in action. Year 9 students took the visitors on tours around as many classes as possible, and it was a joy to see so many different subjects all being taught by our experienced and skilled teachers. We welcomed a lot of families into school for a tour of the site, with visitors having the opportunity to speak to staff before or after the tours. Visitors gave wonderful feedback about how articulate, polite and kind the tour guides were, and we are very proud of the sterling job that they did. Visitors were also impressed with the



school's calm and purposeful atmosphere when walking around site. In January we will be inviting existing parents to have a tour of the school, so please watch out for this invitation soon. Year 6 parents have now made their applications for secondary schools and they will find out which school they are allocated in March.

### **Presentation Evening**

Wednesday 27<sup>th</sup> November 2024 was our arranged special evening for our Testbourne Alumni. Now studying as Year 12 students at various colleges, completing A levels, T levels and Apprenticeships, our former students returned to Testbourne for an evening to celebrate their achievements and collect their GCSE Certificates.

The evening was introduced by Mrs MacAulay, Dr Wilson, Mrs Gray and Mr Alderman and students then signed to collect their certificates. There was also a chance to speak to the many staff who came to find out more about the further studies their ex-students have gone on to take.



It was wonderful to see so many students sharing their next steps and their hopes for their future. Good luck for the future to all our students – your results were amazing and we wish you all the best!



## Mock Exams and Year 11 Exam Update for 2025

In November, our current Year 11 students, the class of 2025, completed their first round of mock exams. On Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> December, students had their own 'mock' results day, where they had to collect and sign for their mock exam results, in the same way they will for their real results in August next year. This was a great event, with Year 11 students collectively opening and celebrating their results with their peers. Our mock results day was followed by Year 11 Parents' Evening, which provided parents the opportunity to discuss their results with their subject teachers.



Revision sessions, known as ELKs at TCS - Enhanced

Learning and Knowledge sessions – will begin in the New Year, starting Monday 13<sup>th</sup> January 2025. Each subject area will provide a programme of weekly support on key topics in preparation for the final exams.

For students sitting their final GCSE exams in 2025, 2026 and 2027, the exams regulator in England, Ofqual, has confirmed that they require exam boards to provide students with formulae and equation sheets in GCSE Mathematics, Physics and Combined Science exams. Exam boards have published their formulae and equation sheets ready for the 2025 exams – these are available to download from exam board websites (AQA for Maths & Science GCSEs sat at TCS in 2025). Students in Year 11 were provided with formulae and equation sheets during their November mock exams. We are pleased that Ofqual has reached this decision.

pages. New year's resolutions could include trying something new next term, so do encourage the students to come along and get involved!




# **Testbourne Community Fireworks Display**

Thank you to everyone who was involved in making the production such a success! It was heartwarming to see


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so many parents, carers and members of the community join us for the evening performances and enjoy the show. There have been so many lovely comments following the production.

### **DofE Bronze and Silver Award**

New DofE Bronze and Silver Award groups for 2025 at Testbourne

**New Bronze DofE group –** Year 10 students have begun their DofE Bronze Awards following an information evening for parents and students held in October, application forms being completed, and two introductory sessions in November. This year's group is the school's biggest ever, with almost 60 students having sent in application forms. We look forward to getting started with expedition training from January onwards, and walking/camping expeditions will take place in May and July 2025. The information evening



also encouraged parents to help out – so many thanks to lan, Clare and Tom, our new parent volunteers, who join our fantastic team of leaders. DofE at Testbourne just wouldn't be possible without them, so a huge thank you as ever for all the time that leaders put in to planning and running activities for DofE.

**New Silver DofE group –** Year 11s who had already completed their DofE Bronze Award attended a lunchtime meeting in October to hear about plans for the Silver Award this year. For only the second time ever at Testbourne, we will be giving students the opportunity to complete their Silver Award. We have now signed up 8 students who are getting started with their volunteering, physical and skill activity sections. These students will take part in two expeditions in July 2025, after their GCSE exams.

**Certificate presentation in April 2025 –** Next term will see a certificate presentation evening for Year 11s who have completed their Bronze Awards in the last few months. We are delighted that 32 students have already signed off their whole Bronze Award. # **Walking Talking Mocks**

Exams by their nature are meant to be challenging – but for some students, they can be stressful or even overwhelming. Some students simply worry about having to sit silently in a large hall; others fret over precisely what is expected of them in their answers. However, working with their teachers, we can mitigate this stress and empower students by practising in the exam environment in a supported way; through this, students' confidence can often increase as their fears are replaced with familiarity. This is the grounding for the 'walking-talking mock' model of coaching students through an exam-duration practice assessment.



Furthermore, these experiences are the epitome of modelling. Testbourne's English Literature WTM focussed on thesis statements – getting productively started in producing focused answers – and clear planning, using resources from our experienced team of English teachers, led by Mr Matthews.

Rather than seeing students feeling overwhelmed, the cognitive load being too much – the students rose to the challenge! We covered all manner of things during the walking-talking mock session to help guide students to success, such as:

- Finding the focus of the question by highlighting the keywords.
- Considering the marking tariff and length of response.
- Working on careful time management.
- Understanding the Assessment Objectives (AOs) required for each question and how to construct a successful answer.

So, are walking-talking mocks a valuable use of time? Most definitely. The proof of the benefits came in the outcome of the actual Literature mock exam, which was very successful. Few students made errors in the real mock regarding question selection and time management was much improved.

If students believe in themselves, and are given the skills, they are more likely to succeed...

### **Jeans for Genes Day**

On Friday 20th September, Testbourne students were encouraged to wear a pair of jeans to school, raising awareness and money for the charity 'Jeans for Genes', as well as raising money for the school PTFA. Examples of some genetic conditions include haemophilia, cystic fibrosis, alkaptonuria and Down's syndrome. The students who wore jeans made a donation and as a school we raised £553. Half of the money raised was sent to 'Jeans for Genes' and the other half went into the school PTFA fund. Lots of Testbourne students rose to the occasion and enjoyed wearing their jeans for the school day!



## **Careers - Sky Studios Workshop / Army Elite Skills Workshop**

A group of our Key Stage 3 students visited Sky Studios in London for an unforgettable Fiction Workshop. The trip allowed students to step into the world of professional storytelling, exploring scriptwriting, editing and production techniques. Guided by industry experts, they created their own short stories and learned how ideas are transformed into compelling narratives for television. This handson experience helped spark creativity and a deeper understanding of the media industry.

Meanwhile, our Year 10 students welcomed a team from the Army for an engaging careers presentation,



which highlighted the diverse roles and pathways available within the armed forces. Following the presentation, students participated in an Elite Skills Workshop held outside, where they tackled teambuilding challenges designed to test their leadership, problem-solving and communication skills. The activities not only provided insight into military careers but also equipped students with transferable skills valuable for any future profession.

Both these careers events underscored our commitment to providing enriching experiences that inspire and prepare students for success beyond the classroom. We are proud of the enthusiasm and teamwork shown by our students and look forward to offering more opportunities like these in the future.



#### **Restart a Heart Day**

Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> October was national 'Restart a Heart Day', an event organised by the Resuscitation Council UK along with the British Heart Foundation, British Red Cross, St John Ambulance and NHS organisations. Its focus is the promotion of CPR techniques and raising awareness of defibrillators in the community. Testbourne was proud to welcome Peter Turner, a Community First Responder with the Ambulance Service, who led three sessions with Key Stage 3 students who had applied to be trained in these life-saving skills.



### **Remembrance Day 2024**

On Remembrance Sunday, two of our Year 11 Executive and Senior Prefects, Leon C and Owen B, accompanied Mrs MacAulay to the Remembrance Service in War Memorial Park in Basingstoke. It was a very moving service and brought together representatives from many community groups and organisations. The flypast by the Chinook at 11am is always an impressive sight and it marked the start of the two minutes silence. Leon and Owen laid a wreath on behalf of Testbourne and were superb ambassadors for the school.

On Remembrance Day the school remembered the sacrifice of those who have given their life in service to this country to maintain the freedoms we now enjoy. In tutor groups in the morning, students designed their own poppy; these were then collected and turned into a tutor group wreath. These were then displayed in each tutor base throughout the remainder of the day.

Students returned to their tutor bases later that morning where an assembly was played to all tutor groups where Mr Wickenden explained why we remember and the importance of Remembrance Day. Year 11 student, Miriam F, also contributed to the assembly by doing a reading of 'In Flanders Fields'. All students – including Year 11, who came directly from a mock exam – then





gathered on the school playground where Lt Slack led Cadets in the lowering of the standards ceremony. The Last Post was played by Alun Grace and the ceremony ended with the playing of the Reveille. Students observed the two minute silence impeccably as always, and were a credit to the school.





### **Christmas Carol Service at All Hallows Church**

The Testbourne Carol Service took place on Wednesday 11<sup>th</sup> December in All Hallows Church. Nearly 60 students sang, played and delivered readings to tell the Christmas story in a traditional carol service format that originated in King's College, Cambridge, in the 1920s. This year our congregation were welcomed to the church by our Brass Ensemble playing carols outside the church entrance, whilst the bell ringers from the church community made the bells peel to announce the start of our service. Members of the church choir also joined with our school choir in this collaborative event with the local community. We all enjoyed refreshments courtesy of our school PTFA, and went away feeling that the Christmas season had truly begun.





### Hampshire Book Awards Ceremony 2024

For the wonderful Hampshire Book Awards Ceremony, a group of Year 9 readers (including myself) were able to go to Calthorpe Park School to meet Rachel Delahaye, the author of the winning book, 'Electric Life'. It was an amazing experience as she told us about what she thought of the dystopian themes in the book and told us about the writing and publishing process. ### **3G Pitch Awards**

Testbourne has been awarded a Hampshire Football Association 3G ATP Pitch of the Year Award, which recognises the very best artificial playing surfaces across Hampshire. The award recipients are selected by a panel of industry experts, including the partners and sponsors of the award, Technical Surfaces, and Hampshire FA's facilities team. The citation for Testbourne's Award is as follows:

Testbourne's 3G Pitch was officially opened in March 2019. It is a much valued and much used resource for the community and is hugely beneficial in developing grassroots sport at a local level. The pitch provides



the school's PE Department with a first-class facility, enabling activities to take place in all weathers. Local community and sports organisations enjoy the opportunity to play on a FA registered pitch and provide sport and physical activity for all. Partner clubs including Whitchurch FC and Overton Youth FC are fantastic clubs to work alongside and their membership numbers in both girls' and boys' teams have increased vastly over the last three years. The Testbourne Site Team is committed to ensuring that the pitch is well maintained all year round and the school and partner clubs are incredibly grateful for their efforts.

# **GCSE Music BrightSparks Trip**

Twenty seven students recently headed to The Royal Festival Hall on the South Bank, London, to watch the London Philharmonic Orchestra for a special performance created for GCSE Music students. They performed a range of music that would help further musical knowledge in line with the GCSE music syllabus. We heard a performance of Bach's Badinerie – a complex piece for flute and orchestra, which really helped the music to come alive for our students. The concert was accompanied by a very knowledgeable compère and was an interactive experience, with quizzes and information appearing on the screen behind the orchestra as the music was being played.



The concert had something for everyone, with music from 1700s right up to 2022; it catered for musicians of all levels, using the wide range of musical vocabulary that our students need to know at GCSE level. Bright Sparks is part of the London Philharmonic Orchestra's education programme, and we hope to be successful in the ticketing ballot for future performances.



# **Robotics Club and Lego League**

A team of ten Year 8 students have been taking part in a Robotics Club learning how to program using Lego Spike Prime. They will be using these skills to take part in the first Lego League Challenge tournament in March 2025. The challenge involves the team competing against other schools in four areas:

- 1. Robot Design Design and build a Lego robot.
- 2. Robot Game Program the robot to complete missions.
- **3. Innovation Project** Identify and research a problem, design and create a solution and present their project ideas.
- 4. Core Values Work on and demonstrate core values of teamwork, inclusion, impact, innovation, discovery and fun.



The challenge is a global STEM programme for teams of young people, to encourage an interest in real world themes and develop key skills that are crucial for their future careers. This year the theme of the challenge is 'Submerged'. The team has been researching issues relating to our oceans and exploring environmental solutions.



# **PE Updates**

#### Year 7 Rugby Development Day

On a very sunny day in November we took a group of 12 students to Trojans Rugby Club annual rugby development day. The students had shown an interest from their PE lessons and had started coming to after school rugby club. They had never played a competitive match before.
